A big, but cautious bay role for the General Assembly (Daily Press)



Issues involving crabs, oysters and fish sometimes need to age a bit in Virginia's General Assembly, even though the unusually large role in fisheries management it has assumed makes the questions seem familiar.

So, as the couple of dozen aging holders of crab scrape licenses struggle harder to make ends meet dragging softshell crabs from bay eelgrasses, Easter Shore Delegate Rob Bloxom's notion of letting them keep any hard-shell crabs they haul from the bottom won a nod this week from the House Agriculture, Natural Resources and Chesapeake Bay Committee.

2018 Virginia Water Monitoring Council Conference (March 21, 2018)





Funding Opportunity For Nonpoint Source Implementation Projects

(VA Department of Environmental Quality)



The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality's Office of Watershed Programs is making federal Section 319(h) grant funding available to support Nonpoint Source (NPS) implementation projects that will result in advancement

of NPS pollution goals and milestones provided in eligible TMDL implementation plans or watershed based plans (IPs). Eligible implementation plan areas are provided in Table 1.

The purpose of the 2018-2019 Virginia Section 319(h) TMDL Implementation Program Request for Applications (RFA) is to establish a priority list of TMDL implementation projects. Projects on this list will be developed into sub-award agreements as funding becomes available in 2018 and 2019. The complete RFA package can be downloaded from the Department of Environmental Quality.

- Category 1 - New Implementation Projects: Duration up to 36 months, award range \$100,000 - \$400,000.
- Category 2 - Continuing Implementation Projects: Duration up to 36 months, award range \$100,000 - \$400,000.

The Deadline for applications is 11:59 pm, Friday, February 9, 2018.

Five Star And Urban Waters Restoration Grant Program 2018 Request For Proposals

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and the Wildlife Habitat Council, in cooperation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, USDA Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, FedEx, and Southern Company are pleased to solicit applications for the 2018 Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration program. The Five Star and Urban Waters program will award approximately \$2 million in grants nationwide.

Interested, but not sure if your project qualifies?

Projects include a variety of ecological improvements along with targeted community outreach, education and stewardship. Ecological improvements may include one or more of the following: wetland, riparian, forest and coastal habitat restoration; wildlife conservation, community tree canopy enhancement, water quality monitoring and stormwater management. Projects should also increase access to the benefits of nature, reduce the impact of environmental hazards and engage local communities, particularly underserved communities, in project planning, outreach and implementation.
